





A majority of students referred to CARE were first year students who experience a combination of personal, social, and academic concerns that are affecting their experiences at TCNJ.

Comparing the distribution of CARE students by race and ethnicity and international status to that of the overall campus population as reported in Fall 2018






CARE Students by Sex


Type of Referral Reason/Student Concerns

Top 20 Concerns



Mental health and academics are the top reasons for CARE referrals. There was a decrease in mental health referrals for the spring semester, likely due to the move to remote learning with less eyes on students. Missing classes and general wellness concerns increased, again likely due to the COVID-19 pandemic, where there was more concern for students who were no longer participating in classes or unresponsive to communication. We added a new concern type in Spring 2020, "COVID-19 Related-concerns" to address pandemic related issues.

Reflections and future goals

- Mental health remains a top concern/reason referrals for students
- Referrals were down this year compared to last academic year, in part due to remote learning
- "COVID-19 related concerns", "Physical/Medical Concern", Financial Concerns" could all increase next semester as the pandemic and economic concerns continue to mount
- Improvements need to be made related to accurate collection of race, ethnicity and gender identity data
- In future reports we hope to have more demographic data (% of veterans, on/off-campus residential status, athlete, EOF, etc.), retention data and student assessment results
